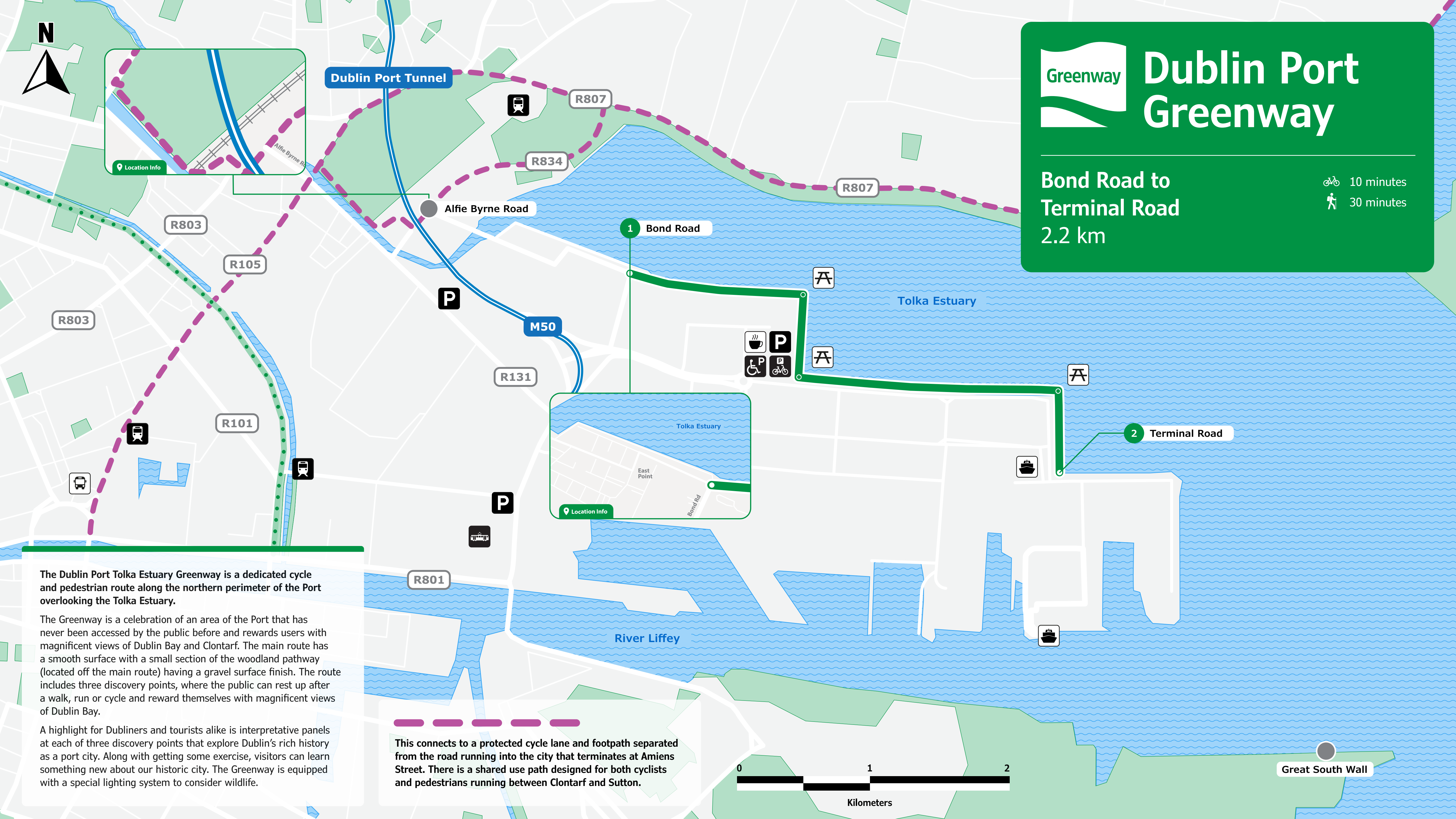




The Dublin Port Tolka Estuary Greenway is a dedicated cycle and pedestrian route along the northern perimeter of the Port overlooking the Tolka Estuary.

The Greenway is a celebration of an area of the Port that has never been accessed by the public before and rewards users with magnificent views of Dublin Bay and Clontarf. The main route has a smooth surface with a small section of the woodland pathway (located off the main route) having a gravel surface finish. The route includes three discovery points, where the public can rest up after a walk, run or cycle and reward themselves with magnificent views of Dublin Bay.

A highlight for Dubliners and tourists alike is interpretative panels at each of three discovery points that explore Dublin's rich history as a port city. Along with getting some exercise, visitors can learn something new about our historic city. The Greenway is equipped with a special lighting system to consider wildlife.

This connects to a protected cycle lane and footpath separated from the road running into the city that terminates at Amiens Street. There is a shared use path designed for both cyclists and pedestrians running between Clontarf and Sutton.

## Accessing the Greenway

This greenway is short in length but offers spectacular views of Dublin Bay and is worth a visit. The route is also directly connected to the growing walking and cycling network in Dublin City enabling visitors to extend their trip to include a trip to Clontarf or opt to travel to the Dublin Port Tolka Estuary Greenway by walking, wheeling or cycling.

The Greenway route starts at the access point located on Bond Road. You can opt to travel from the city centre to the Alfie Byrne Road or from Clontarf via dedicated cycleway and foot path separated from the road by a raised kerb. Leaving the Alfie Byrne Road, you will cross into the East Point Business Park crossing the East Point Causeway. In the Business Park, there is a foot path located on top of the embankment running adjacent to the shoreline through the East Point Business Park, you should cycle on the road – this is a low trafficked, low speed environment. From the access point at Bond Road, you will join the Greenway.

## 1-2 Bond Road to Terminal Road South 2.2 km

Access to the Greenway begins just off Bond Road. The route includes three discovery points, where the public can rest up after a walk, run or cycle and reward themselves with attractive views across Dublin Bay towards Clontarf. The opening stretch is a calm, tree-lined route where carefully designed planting softens the surrounding industrial landscape. Seasonal planting provides shade, colour and visual relief for walkers and cyclists.

The path then opens out to the waterside, offering attractive views across Dublin Bay towards Clontarf. Interpretative panels at each discovery point off visitors an opportunity to learn more about Dublin's rich history as a port city. Continue along the shoreline until the route concludes at Terminal Road South, directly opposite the passenger ferry terminal.
